James Elmer Abram passed away peacefully after a courageous battle with cancer.

Born in Jasper County, Missouri on the family farm, August 12, 1929 to Eva Ann Stroup and John Elmer Abram. Growing up on the family farm, Jim completed his elementary and secondary school before enlisting in the Army. After two years in the service he came home and did one year of community college, focusing on pre-engineering.

On October 9, 1949 he married the love of his life, Louise Kirksey. They had 68 years of life, full of love, travel & companionship, Louise at his side supporting him in all his visions and many business ventures.

Before moving to the Columbia Basin, they lived in several cities, ultimately buying a business and settling in Moses Lake in 1957. He and Louise were the owners/operators of the Conoco Bulk Plant.

After selling the bulk plant his next vision was to come up with a way to bring airline companies to Moses Lake to train their pilots. With the help of Senator Magnuson, that dream became a reality, resulting in the creation of JETT-AERO, which provided aircraft ground support & fueling services.

After the sale of JETT-AERO, Jim continued on the Board of Directors for the Washington Trust Bank in Spokane. He also remained focused on start-up

companies that exhibited a vibrant, entrepreneurial spirit, from new and innovative developments in agriculture, to SPACE-X and other forward-thinking endeavors.

Jim was an avid fisherman and hunter, but let's not forget master gardener... always challenging friends to see who could grow the biggest tomato!

Jim, a man of faith, lived by example. He was a gentleman, a man of integrity. He encouraged those who knew him well to strive to be their best. He will be missed by many.

Jim is survived by his wife Louise, their daughter Teresa and son-in-law Clyde Gies of Moses Lake, sister-in-law Leeanna Kirksey of Portland Oregon, granddaughter Megan, two great-grandchildren, Nicholas and Samoa and several nieces & nephews.

“ Tribute to Jim Abram

During the late 60's, I had the privilege to work for Jim at his Fixed Base Operation, Jet

Air, at the Grant County Airport. His progressive thinking set in place the necessary

infrastructure to service the many Boeing Training flights that utilized the airport during

those times. He pursued the potential Japan Air Training facility at great personal

expense, which came to fruition in 1968. That operation continued to an economic

and relational blessing to the city for 40 years.

Working for Jim was one of the greatest experiences of my life. He was such a humble

gentleman that treated us all with such respect. We all felt like we were such a part of

his effort to bring success to the airport, and the community.

I was a college kid, just trying to support my “flying habit” as a student in Big Bend’s

aviation program. There were times when it was crazy busy out on the flight line, and

sometimes not so much. Even during the slow times, he kept me on the payroll. Jim

was committed to customer service, so we were always open from the time that the

control tower opened at 6:00 AM until it closed until....well, whenever the last training

flight of the day departed - usually sometime after 10:00 PM. Every day of the week

and holidays included - he wanted us there to serve the needs of the flying public.

Since I was on my own at college, with my family back in the Midwest, I'd volunteer to

work the holidays so that the other employees could be home with family - it just made

sense. During my tenure, every Thanksgiving, every Christmas, and

every Easter, Jim & Louise would show up out at the airport with a holiday dinner with all the trimmings for me. That had quite an impact on me in those formative years. I often thought that when I grow up, I'm gonna be a "giver" like Jim & Louise. Years later...I had opportunity to return to Moses Lake and work at the Air Traffic Control Tower. One of the first folks I bumped into upon my return was Jim. Even though I was just one of the many employees that came and went from Jet Air, Jim recognized me and gave me the warmest welcome as if long lost friends. Subsequent to that, we enjoyed many meals and good times together. Jim & Louise worshiped at the Moses Lake Missionary and Alliance Church. They were more than "church goers", they lived their faith. They believed in and supported the Moses Lake Christian School. I know that they quietly helped many in the community throughout the years, as well. If there was ever a role model for one to follow, Jim was it. I know that upon his arrival in Heaven, our Lord greeted him with "...well done, good and faithful servant".

“ The following is a tribute from Scott Dietzen:

I knew Jim for more than 45 years. I recall the relationship that he and Louise had with my parents dating back to the early 1970's. Jim and Louise lived out on Wheeler Road and I recall them hosting contestants for the Miss Moses Lake Pageant in the spring of 1972 or 1973. My sister was a contestant. Jim and my father both invested in a commercial mushroom growing facility in one of the hangars at the Port of Moses Lake and I believe that both were investors in Eastern Washington Bank. Jim walked alongside my father as he endured the death of my mother and then the onset of dementia prior to my father's death in 1995.

I became closer to Jim after I joined LeMaster & Daniels in 1987. Jim served as a mentor to me especially after my father passed. He was that experienced voice available to me at any time while I considered various decisions. Specifically, Jim sold a 10-acre parcel of ground to me and my wife in 1991 and I developed that piece of property with a home, garage, outbuildings, corrals and pasture. Jim and Louise and Rick & Patty Honsowetz helped us finance that piece of property that served as the home where we raised our children over a span of 18 years. That property allowed us to raise livestock which created the framework for developing discipline and character in our children. We see the fruits of that effort today as our children begin that same journey of raising a family.

Jim avoided the spotlight and is rarely mentioned for his accomplishments in Moses Lake. He was very instrumental in landing Japan Airlines and helping foster a deep relationship with the airline and its executives over several decades. His entrepreneurial spirit served the jet fuel industry, agriculture and banking to name a few. He represented what I believe it means to be an American, to enjoy freedom, to take risk, create jobs, serve others and give back. His commitment to God and his church served as an example for many including me.

Although I did not see Jim much over the past 9 years since we moved to Spokane, I am deeply indebted to his influence and molding of my life. I seek opportunities to mentor other young men, husbands and fathers as a sign of appreciation for all Jim did for me.

I recall with smiles and even laughter yet today, the memories of fishing with Jim and the other men off the Queen Charlotte Islands.
